## **Current Situation**

## Highlights:

- 46% of the cases (130) have been in people between the ages of 35 to 64 years, while 30% (85) have been reported in those aged 65 years or older.
- 34% of cases are community acquired, with 23% acquired through close contact.
- Females represent 57% of those infected with the virus.
- 58 cases are related to institutional outbreaks with 6 ongoing and one declared over.

#### Highlights:

- A total of 294,054 tests have been completed, with 11,975 being investigated.
- There are currently 225 people in ICU with 175 on ventilators.
- There have been 198 outbreaks reported in long-term care homes accounting for almost 50% of the COVID-19 related deaths in the province.
- 44.7% of cases are in those 60 years of age or older.
- Females represent 57.4% of those infected with the virus.
- The GTA represents almost 59.5% of cases in Ontario.

## Highlights:

- Canada now ranks 12<sup>th</sup> in the highest number of cases of COVID-19 of any country.
  - 832,222 people have been tested. The weekly percent positivity is 8%. The cumulative percent positivity is 6.9%
- Cough, headache and weakness are the most common symptoms reported.
- Based on available reports (56%, n=30,041)
  - o Females represent 55% of those infected with the virus.
  - o 81% of cases are related to community transmission.
  - The highest proportion of cases is in the 40-59 year old age group (32%), followed by the 20-39 year old age group (26%).
  - 37% of cases are in those 60 years of age and older (representing 2 age groups).
     These individuals also have the highest proportion of hospitalizations (66%), ICU admissions (64%),
- Based on available hospitalization data (65%, n=30,041)
  - 16% (3,087) people have been hospitalized, and almost 1 in 4 hospitalizations (741) received intensive care.

## Global Situation (As of 20:00 CEST April 30, 2020)

- Globally, the number of people who have been infected with COVID-19 has exceeded 3.1 million, with over 224,000 related deaths in 215 countries/areas/territories.
- One-third of the global cases are now from the United States with more cases (over 1 million) and deaths (over 55,000) than any other country in the world.
- 72,850 new cases were reported April 30<sup>th</sup>, + 6,424 from the day before.
- 9,785 new deaths were reported April 30<sup>th</sup>, + 4,407 from the day before.

#### **SMDHU Key Messages**

#### **Re-opening:**

 Provincial changes coming - Today Ontario Government announced it will allow more businesses to reopen on May 4, including garden centres and nurseries (curb-side pickup and delivery only), car washes, car dealerships by appointment, lawn care and landscaping businesses and a wider array of construction projects shuttered under earlier orders. They also encouraged golf courses and marinas to prepare for the summer season as long as they stay closed to the public.

- It has prepared sector-specific guidelines to help protect workers, customers and the general public from COVID-19 as it prepares for a gradual reopening of the provincial economy. Guidelines released for six sectors including: Construction, Food processing, Restaurant and Food services, Agriculture Manufacturing, Long-term Care
- Our website will provide a link to this information shortly and whenever new sectors are added. Check back often for new information. Success will depend on all businesses, all workers and each of us to maintain the necessary precautions. Need to take small cautious steps. Information is linked on our webpage on a new Reopening Your Business Safely page.

## Please stay at your primary residence:

- On Wednesday April 29, 2020, Dr. Gardner appeared on <u>CBC's Ontario Morning with Wei Chen</u>. Dr. Gardner has asked the Chief Medical Officer of Health to advocate that the province include this in a directive (i.e. disallowing people to access their secondary residences at this time). Dr. Gardner will also continue to state to the public that they should not access their secondary residences in Simcoe Muskoka at this time.
- We heard from the Premier today that we need to proceed slowly and cautiously as we
  work to continue to push the curve down. You will note that marinas, golf courses and
  other seasonal businesses remain closed. We hope this reaffirms the message that it is
  not time to go to your seasonal residences whether it is in Simcoe County or the
  Muskoka region.
- SMDHU is appealing to informed, responsible people to stay home and help us all get through this public health emergency together.

## **Universal Basic Income**

- We recognize the deep personal economic impact the pandemic is having on individuals and families and are in support of the financial measures both levels of government have contributed. We also recognize that inequities that existed before this crisis are being amplified and that people living on low incomes are subject to worse health outcomes and quality of life. There is a growing call from the senate and other politicians to implement a basic income for Canadians. We are pleased to see that last week, 50 members of Canada's Senate, including some of our own local politicians, wrote a letter to Prime Minister Justin Trudeau calling on the government to implement a minimum basic income.
- It is a measure that our Board of Health has been advocating for a number of years. We
  have long been a champion of the concept of a universal basic income that ensures
  everyone an income sufficient to meet basic needs and live with dignity, regardless of
  work status. As the world evolves as we emerge from the pandemic we will continue to
  add our voices to the call for a universal basic income.

#### Provincial

- The Government of Ontario:
  - Issued new temporary emergency orders under the Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act to support the immediate needs of the province's hospitals and health care workers so they can better manage critical health care human resources during COVID-19.
  - Announced <u>certain businesses can reopen</u> May 4 under strict safety guidelines including:
    - Garden centres and nurseries with curbside pick-up and delivery only;
    - Lawn care and landscaping;
    - Additional essential construction projects;
    - Automatic and self-serve car washes;
    - Auto dealerships, open by appointment only;
    - Golf courses to prepare for the upcoming season, but not open to the public; and
    - Marinas may also prepare for recreational boating season by servicing boats and other watercraft and placing boats in the water, but not open to the public. Boats and watercraft must be secured to a dock in the marina until public access is allowed.

- Released <u>resources to prevent covid-19 in the workplace</u>, as a source of guidance for specific work sectors. As new sectors of the economy begin to reopen, additional COVID-19 workplace safety resources will be added.
  - Resources include <u>downloadable</u> posters to promote a variety of useful safety tips on physical distancing and sanitation.
  - The 61 sector-specific guidelines are available <u>here</u> from Ontario's health and safety associations.
  - Guidelines for construction are available <u>here</u>.
- Released <u>safety guidelines</u> to those working in manufacturing, food manufacturing and processing, restaurant and food service, and the agricultural sector. The Ontario government is ensuring employers have the safety guidelines they need to protect workers, customers, and the general public from COVID-19 as it prepares for a gradual reopening of the provincial economy.
- Launched a <u>new free 511 app for truckers</u> to have immediate access to the information they need to stay safe, fed and rested while delivering essential goods.
- Announced it is <u>expanding the list of essential workers eligible for free emergency</u> <u>child care</u> during the COVID-19 outbreak. Those who will benefit include people who work in the food supply chain, retirement homes, grocery stores and pharmacies, and certain federal employees, including the military.
- Announced Ontario will be providing support for industrial and commercial electricity consumers during COVID-19

#### National

 Government of Canada <u>introduced Canada Emergency Student Benefit legislation</u> to support students who are not receiving the CERB. Students enrolled in post-secondary education, whose studies ended no earlier than December 2019 or high-school graduate who have applied for and will be attending a post-secondary program would receive \$1250 per month for up to four months (May – August 2020). Students with dependents or disabilities would receive an additional \$750).

#### International

- WHO published an <u>article</u> about protecting health care workers and communities while providing immunizations, which WHO has <u>urged</u> the continuation of during the pandemic.
- WHO has published technical guidance to support leaders and policy-makers in cities and other urban settings in implementing actions that enhance the prevention, preparedness and readiness for COVID-19, <u>Strengthening Preparedness for Covid-19 in Cities and Urban Settings</u>.

- Reopening your Business Safely- includes sector-specific guidelines that employers can plan for as they prepare to adapt to the new reality during COVID-19.
- Partners and Essential Workplaces- two expander bars were added:
  - Community Gardens- A community garden has either individual or shared plots of land or garden beds on private or public land that community members can use to grow fresh fruits and vegetables. This <u>guidance document</u> is for municipal staff, volunteers and garden users to reduce the risk of exposure to COVID-19, while using a shared garden space.
  - Short Term Rentals: Short term rentals (e.g. Air B&B, VRBO/seasonal rentals) for accommodations booked after April 4, 2020 must only be provided to individuals who are in need of housing during the emergency period. This does not apply to hotels, motels and student residences.
- **COVID-19 Main Page** information about cottages/seasonal residences has been added under an expander bar titled "Avoid heading to your cottage or seasonal residence".
