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Message from the Medical Officer of Health

As many of you may already be aware we received notification of the region's first confirmed case of COVID-19 in a local resident who recently returned from Spain and Germany. The individual is self-isolating and recovering at home. We were informed of this in the early hours of March 12th and informed the public of this new development through a <u>press release</u> and media press conference at 1 p.m. on Thursday.

On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization (WHO) made the assessment that the global COVID-19 outbreak can be characterized as a pandemic which is the "worldwide spread of a new disease". There are no other specific criteria for determining what is a pandemic or not (e.g. number of people infected, number of deaths). In light of this new characterization we continue to actively monitor the global outbreak of respiratory illness caused by COVID-19, as well as the evolving situation provincially and locally.

Current Situation (as of 14:00 March 13, 2020)

- <u>NEW</u> As of March 13, 2020, Ontario's Chief Medical Officer of Health is strongly advising the following to help mitigate the spread of COVID-19
 - o Avoid all non-essential travel outside of Canada;
 - If you decide to travel outside of Canada with children, they will be required to self-isolate for a period of 14 days upon return.
 - o Immediately ***suspend all large events or public gatherings** over 250 people
 - Including colleges and universities (immediately look at virtual options)
 - <u>All licensed child care centers to actively screen</u> children, parents, staff and visitors for any symptoms and travel history that may be related to COVID-19 (based on current case definition)
 - <u>All Ontarians to practice social distancing</u> as much as possible until further notice.

*Large Events or Public Gatherings

- Municipalities, workplaces, event organizers or planners should apply the recommendation of the Ontario Chief Medical Officer of Health of suspending all large events or public gatherings over 250 people
- All organizers must notify the health unit of any potential public gatherings or events so we can support the assessment of risk and assist in putting in place infection prevention and control measures to protect those in attendance.
 - The following document can assist with the risk assessment: <u>Risk-informed</u> <u>decision-making for mass gatherings during COVID-19 global outbreak</u>
 - Organizers who have questions about smaller gathering are encouraged to contact local public health.
- It is recommended that meetings and events be held virtually or postponed rather than in person.
- The Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit (SMDHU) is co-hosting a joint COVID-19 Pandemic Preparedness Forum, along with the County of Simcoe and the District of Muskoka, as the agency, its partners and stakeholders continue planning for the potential arrival of widespread community transmission of the virus.
 - The forum, which takes place Monday March 16 via video and teleconference only, includes a variety of stakeholders and partners from health, education and municipal sectors. A part of the discussion will be how the <u>Simcoe Muskoka interagency pandemic plan</u>, which was updated in 2010 to support the County of Simcoe and the District of Muskoka in the event of an influenza pandemic. This can be adapted and utilized for coordinated planning response to COVID-19.

Local Situation – Simcoe Muskoka

- There is one person with a confirmed case of COVID-19 in our region.
 - The person in a man in his 40s who recently returned from Spain and Germany. The man went to Royal Victoria Regional Health Centre in Barrie for assessment and testing and is currently at home in selfisolation. All necessary infection and control measures for COVID-19 were taken by the hospital to ensure safety of staff and other patients.
 - The health unit is working closely with the individual to follow up on known contacts who may have potentially been exposed to the virus and possible exposure sites.
- We have heard locally of employers requesting employees gain medical clearance to return to work. We do not support employers requiring staff with no travel history to areas with a travel advisory and upper respiratory infections to be cleared by a physician before returning to work if their symptoms have resolved.
- Note that at times, the ability for the health care system to test may be exceeded by the demand. As per the province, COVID-19 testing at this time will only be available to the following groups. People who:
 - have symptoms and are a contact of a confirmed case(s), until community transmission is established
 - o have been admitted to hospital with acute respiratory illness
 - o are health care workers with acute respiratory illness
 - have acute respiratory illness who live in long term care homes and retirement homes
 - have acute respiratory illness who live in other institutions and as directed by the health unit
 - are health care workers as part of a health care institutional outbreaks and as directed by the health unit
 - are First Nation Community members living on-reserve with acute respiratory illness
- Travelers who have returned from a COVID-impacted area need to self-monitor for signs and symptoms of illness for 14 days. If within 14 days of returning, they have fever (over 38 degrees Celsius) and/or onset of (or exacerbation of chronic) cough, they are asked to <u>self-isolate</u> at home until 24 hours after symptoms have resolved. The impacted area* is based on current epidemiology and <u>World</u> <u>Health Organization (WHO) Situation Report</u> which currently includes over 100 countries. At this time, such ill travelers as a group are not on the list of persons to be tested.

Provincial Situation – Ontario

- As of 3:55 on March 12 the <u>Provincial Government announced</u> that Ontario schools have been ordered to remain closed from March 14 through to April 5, 2020.

Risk Assessment

- WHO <u>Situation Report</u> states "If you are not in an area where COVID-19 is spreading or have not travelled from an area where COVID-19 is spreading or have not been in contact with an infected patient, your risk of infection is low".
- Although the <u>Public Health Agency of Canada</u> continues to assess the public health risk associated with 2019-nCoV as *low* for the general population in Canada this could change rapidly.
- Communities, organizations, businesses and families need to be prepared for potential disruption to normal life if the virus starts to infect people locally. Information and tips about how to prepare are posted on our <u>website</u>.

Public Health Planning and Response

SMDHU

- At this time, many staff have been actively deployed. This disruption to our everyday business means that it is not business as usual for the health unit and as a consequence certain health unit functions are being assessed and either deferred or being curtailed until our response to COVID-19 is over.

Provincial

The Ontario Ministry of Health has provided:

- an updated case definition based on the most up-to-date evidence
- <u>updated IPAC recommendations</u> for the use of personal protective equipment (PPE) for care of individuals with suspect or confirmed COVID-19;
- guidance for active screening of visitors to long term care homes
- fact sheets for: a) self-monitoring for symptoms, b) self-isolation, and c) guidance for caregivers, household members and close contacts are now available on the <u>Public Health Ontario website</u>.

Public Health Ontario has provided:

• guidance in <u>English</u> and <u>French</u> for environmental cleaning for non-heath care settings.

The Ministry of Health is doing the following:

- continuing to work with federal and local partners to support the remaining repatriated citizens under quarantine and those in self-isolation.
- working to increase capacity to reduce wait times on Telehealth;
- implementing sentinel testing of all hospital emergency rooms and people hospitalized with respiratory illness;
- working with local communities to set up assessment centers;

• involved in future scenario planning amongst provincial partners and stakeholders.
