Simcoe Muskoka COVID-19 Case Status (As of June 2, 2020 at 13:00)

Highlights:

- There have been no new deaths reported in almost two weeks (since May 20th).
- Of the 480 people who have had COVID-19, 461 (96%) have been from Simcoe and 19 (4%) have been from Muskoka.
- Although the number of cases per 100,000 people (incidence rate) of COVID-19 disease is significantly lower in Simcoe Muskoka than in Ontario, the number of deaths per 100 people (case fatality rate) is similar (Simcoe Muskoka: 7.5%; Ontario 8.1%).
- 22% of people who have had COVID-19 and 64% of those who have died from COVID-19 are connected to an institutional outbreak.
- 12% of all people who have had COVID-19 have been hospitalized and 4% have required treatment in the ICU.
- Individuals aged 45-64 years account for the largest proportion of cases (30%)
- Seniors 80 years of age or older are more likely to contract COVID-19 (with incidence rate of 196 per 100,000 population) and are more likely to result in death (with a fatality rate of 36 deaths per 100 cases).
- There have been a total of 10 institutional outbreaks in Simcoe Muskoka with one continued outbreak related to COVID-19. See the <u>list of current institutional outbreaks</u> for more details.

Highlights:

- In the last day, 17 people have died of COVID-19 in Ontario.
- A total of 747,964 tests have been completed with 15,244 tests completed yesterday, 10,622 tests are currently being investigated.
- There are currently 125 people in ICU with 87 on ventilators.
- 12.3% of people with COVID-19 have been hospitalized.
- Almost 25% of people who have had COVID-19 and 64% of those who have died from COVID-19 in Ontario are among residents and health care workers in long-term care homes.
- There have been 309 outbreaks reported in long-term care homes, with about one-third still in active outbreak.
- The GTA represents 66.2% of cases in Ontario.

Highlights:

- Although there continues to be a decreasing trend in the number of new cases, there
 appears to be an upward trend in the number of new deaths. According to the WHO
 Dashboard, the last time Canada had more deaths than yesterday (213) was May 4,
 2020. Almost 95% of the deaths that occurred yesterday happened in Quebec.
- 87% of cases (Quebec: 56%, Ontario: 31%) and 94.5% deaths (Quebec: 63.5%, Ontario: 31%) continue to be reported from Quebec and Ontario.
- Yesterday, people with new cases of COVID-19 were reported in Quebec, Ontario, Alberta, New Brunswick, Saskatchewan and Manitoba
- Yesterday, people died of COVID-19 in Quebec, Ontario and Saskatchewan.
- A total of 1,721,511 tests have been completed with a test rate of almost 45,000 people tested per million population.
- The number of people tested for COVID-19 who tested positive continues to decrease and is now lower than it was in mid-March.

SMDHU Medical Officer of Health Key Messages

• Enhanced Provincial Testing Strategy

- Ontario has announced a further enhanced testing strategy including proactive surveillance testing to detect outbreaks and more actively monitoring any spread among our most vulnerable populations in hospitals, long-term care homes, group homes, shelters, emergency child care centres, correctional facilities and other shared living spaces.
- Testing will include symptomatic and asymptomatic residents and frontline staff in long-term care and retirement homes, as well as those working with priority populations, including first responders, essential workers and other workplaces.
- o If you think you've been exposed or if you have at least one symptom you are encouraged to be tested. If you are self-isolating (because you are a case contact of a person who is a positive case) you must still remain in self-isolation for the full 14 days regardless of the result of a test.

Day Camp Guidance

- Guidance for day camps to operate this summer was released from the Province June 1st. No overnight camps will be permitted as previously announced. Procedures will include:
 - Daily screening of staff and camp participants before programming begins:
 - Limiting the number of children in a group, with a single counsellor;
 - Keeping groups from mixing in washrooms and at drop off/pickup;
 - Minimizing shared equipment, proper cleaning before use by another group;
 - Physical distancing, face coverings where/when recommended, frequent handwashing, sanitization procedures;
 - Campers bringing own water bottle, no self-serve food items will be provided;
 - Restrictions on types of field trips as no group transportation will be permitted.

The World Health Organization (WHO)

- Published <u>key planning recommendations for mass gatherings</u> in the context of the current COVID-19 outbreak. The document provides guidance on containing risks of COVID-19 transmission associated with mass gathering events.
- Regional Director for Europe, has released a statement analyzing the COVID-19
 pandemic in Europe and emphasizing that <u>recovery must lead to a different economy, an
 economy of well-being.</u>
- Published a <u>case report form for suspected cases of multisystem inflammatory syndrome</u> (MIS) in children and adolescents temporally related to COVID-19.
