Current Situation

Simcoe Muskoka COVID-19 Case Status (As of July 29, 2020 at 13:00) Total cases Recovered Deaths Current Hospitalizations 655 593 36 3 + 3 since yesterday +4 since yesterday No change -1 since last report +16 since last report +27 since last report since last report

- Locally, there are currently 24 people known to have an active case of COVID-19; approximately half of all active cases are among those under the age of 35.
- 59% of cases reported locally have no known epidemiological link, with the cumulative rate with no epidemiological link at 31%.
- There is currently one active COVID-19 outbreak in a local retirement home, with positive tests in one staff member and one resident.
- Since the pandemic began, 94% of those with positive COVID-19 tests are contacted within one day of being reported to public health.
- Simulations show that public health measures and collective efforts have potentially averted up to 104,000 people in Simcoe Muskoka from contracting COVID-19.

Highlights:

- There are currently 1,476 known active cases of COVID-19 in Ontario.
- Of these active cases, 91 people are currently hospitalized, with 28 people in ICU.
- In the last week those aged 20-39 had the highest number of new cases.
- There are currently 64 active COVID-19 outbreaks in Ontario (33 long-term care homes, 26 retirement homes, 5 hospitals).
- A total of 2,114,263 tests have been completed with 27,305 tests completed yesterday and 18,268 tests under investigation.

- In Canada, there are currently 5,948 people with known active cases of COVID-19.
- Nationally, the number of daily cases rose over two weeks from July 8 July 21; with eight provinces/territories having increases in their number of cases. The number of new cases is still lower than what was observed in April and May.
- There were 11 COVID-19 related deaths reported in Canada yesterday in the same six provinces reporting new cases (ON, Quebec, Alta, B.C., Sask. and Man).
- Although there is a decreasing trend across all age groups; for the week of July 15-21, 61% of cases were in people under the age of 40, with both males and females in the 20-29 age group having the highest incidence rate of cases compared to any other age group.
- For the week of July 15-21, outbreaks were primarily seen in food and drink establishments, mass gatherings and in faith communities.
- Exposure categories continue to show exposure in Canada by an unknown source as most prevalent (55%). Cases related to international travel have increased since May, but are still low accounting for only 2.3% cases.
- There were 307,663 people tested for COVID-19 from July 13 to July 19 representing the highest one-week total for testing since the pandemic began. The weekly national average percent positivity is 0.9%
- According to forecasting 116,220 to 121,900 cases and 8,870 to 9,050 deaths are expected by 6 August.

- Globally, the pandemic continues to grow with the highest number of cases reported since the beginning of the pandemic during the past week with three days in the past week having the highest number of cases ever (July 24-26).
- In the last week global deaths have increased, with deaths being higher than those
 posted since April 20, 2020 and the highest number of daily deaths (July 24) since the
 global peak on April 17th.
- Yesterday there were 226,783 new cases and 4,153 deaths around the world, with the highest case counts in the U.S., India, Brazil, Colombia and South Africa and the highest number of deaths in the U.S., India, Brazil, Mexico and South Africa.
- The U.S. continues to be the global epicentre of weekly and daily new cases.
- Both Japan and Spain are experiencing a resurgence of COVID-19 with Spain reporting 6,361 new cases yesterday, the highest number of daily cases it has had since April 15th.

Schools and the use of face coverings/masks

The Premier and Minister of Education are expected to announce plans for fall school reopening this week. This work is being done at the provincial level with input from various parties who work with children and schools to find the balance that addresses children's physical and mental health and protects those in education settings from being exposed to COVID-19.

Locally we have a close relationship with our schools boards and schools, with a health unit team that has staff that work in schools and liaise at the board level. The Healthy Schools program is dedicated to addressing the health promotion and protection of children and youth in our school systems, and works with various health unit and community partners to ensure healthy growth and development in their students' school and home environments.

There has been some concern that the face covering instruction issued earlier this month did not have a face covering requirement for schools, day cares and day camps. The reason for this is that there are already provincial guidelines in place for these settings. These provincial guidelines are evolving as the pandemic's impact continues to change as we move through the stages of opening. The bottom line is that the health and safety of our children and youth are at the forefront of all guidelines and requirements.

Face Covering/Mask Questions

We continue to receive many calls and questions about the use of face coverings/masks and when and where they are needed, whether physical distancing is required when wearing face coverings and why some customers, visitors, and staff in indoor settings are not wearing them.

Face coverings are required in indoor settings with exceptions for medical and religious reasons. People who are not wearing a face covering/mask do not need to provide proof of their exemption. Although businesses have the right to insist on the use of face coverings to enter their premises, the instruction from the health unit did not require this. Staff working in indoor settings where there is not a plexiglass barrier to prevent transmission can also be exempt from wearing a face covering.

As the research grows stronger in support of the protective value of face coverings/masks, when used along with other precautions (e.g. physical distancing, handwashing, monitoring health and self-isolating and testing) we ask that you to wear a face covering/mask if you can. You protect others, they protect you.

There are also many questions about face coverings coming in about indoor and outdoor gatherings including weddings; questions such as when do you need to wear a face covering at a wedding? Are the rules the same for any indoor gathering? What are the rules for outdoor events?
