Key messages from Dr. Gardner, Medical Officer of Health

1. School Immunization program update

Current Grade 8 students who have not completed their series of Hep B, HPV and meningitis immunizations due to COVID-19 will be able to get them at health unit offices by appointment only beginning November 2. Information letters are coming out through schools and the information has been <u>posted on our Immunization pages</u> on our website. **Current Grade 7 students** will <u>not</u> be offered immunizations this school year. Immunization catch-up school-based clinics will be offered to these students during the 2021/22 school year.

2. Flu shots, vaccine availability

Flu vaccines have been arriving from manufacturers since late September and will continue through November with priority deliveries made first for long-term care homes, hospitals and other vulnerable care settings. Broader community distribution of the flu shot, including to primary care providers and pharmacies is currently being rolled out across the province. This takes several weeks given the large number of locations where flu vaccine is administered. So if your healthcare setting doesn't have them yet they will be receiving them over the coming weeks and we urge everyone to get vaccinated to protect themselves. It's an important year to get one with COVID-19 circulating as well. We now have 2020 influenza vaccine information posted on our website Immunization pages including information on where to get your flu shot.

3. <u>Simcoe Muskoka On The Move – active school transportation initiative</u>

This week we launched a new web section promoting active school travel as a safe and healthy choice for students and families. Walking or wheeling to and from school is a great way to get exercise, fresh air and social time while still physically distancing from others which is even more important during the COVID-19 pandemic. Active school transportation is also good for the environment, reducing traffic that contributes to greenhouse gas emissions and it helps to fight climate change.

4. Halloween Reminder

Choosing not to trick-or-treat, nor to hand out candy is the most cautious approach this year; an alternative approach to celebrate at home could include virtual costume contests, candy scavenger hunt, and pumpkin carving.

If you choose to participate in trick-or-treating and handing out candy we have a full list of recommendations on our <u>website</u> - but some of the most important include:

- Avoid gatherings with people outside of your household.
- Stay home if feeling ill even if you have mild symptoms, or if you are at higher risk for Serious illness from COVID-19.
- Only go out with members of your direct household.
- Only trick-or-treat outside.
- Both trick-or-treaters and people handing out candy should wear a face covering.

5. <u>Remembrance Day Ceremonies</u>

The importance of honouring our fallen heroes in service of their country and the courage of those who still serve is vital to each family and community in Simcoe Muskoka. However SMDHU and the Province of Ontario are experiencing a second wave of the pandemic. We recommend community members use virtual options for taking part in Remembrance Day ceremonies this year, through online or broadcast services to best protect the health of veterans and community members.

Organizers proceeding with an in-person ceremony risk community transmission of COVID-19. Limit attendees to a token number. Maintain physical distance of no less than 2 metres (6 feet) by all participants at all times. Face coverings should be worn at all times. It is possible that public gatherings may be further restricted in the coming days/weeks. Organizers should be sure to check the province's Ontario regulations to monitor legal compliance and public health precautions going forward.

- In the last day there have been 26 new cases, no new deaths and 13 recoveries reported.
- There are currently five ongoing outbreaks in Simcoe Muskoka, two in long-term care, two in workplaces, and one in a congregate setting.
- There have been 30 students/staff cases reported in 27 elementary and secondary schools with no outbreaks declared to date.
- Of cases that are currently active, 35% are in people under 35 years of age, 35% in people 35 to 64 years of age and 30% in those 65 years of age and older. This indicates an increase in cases in older residents.

• There are currently 143 ongoing outbreaks in health care facilities in Ontario (long-term care homes = 80, retirement homes = 47, hospitals = 16).

- In the last reporting week (October 4-10) the greatest number of cases and outbreaks were reported since the pandemic began with total of 5,059 cases and 127 outbreaks, compared to the previous peak in April which reported 4,267 cases and 91 outbreaks.
- The number of cases in those aged 80 years and over is increasing faster than other age groups again.

The following are national highlights from the last published reporting week of October 4-10:

- The number of new cases increased by 21% over the previous week and 79% compared with two weeks prior.
- The number of reported hospitalizations has been steadily increasing since mid-September.
- There was a continued increase in the number of deaths reported, resulting in an increase in the average number of daily deaths (n=21) compared to the previous week (n=12).
- New cases were reported in all provinces.
- 56% of cases were under the age of 40.
- According to forecasting, between 209,900 to 219,600 cumulative cases and 9,822 to 9,933 cumulative deaths are expected by October 25, 2020.

- The incidence of new COVID-19 cases continues to accelerate, while the incidence of new deaths remains stable.
- The highest number of daily cases reported thus far during the pandemic occurred October 17 with over 400,000 cases occurring in one day.
- Yesterday, 297,815 new cases COVID-19 and 4,039 new deaths were reported around the world, with the highest number of new cases in USA, India, UK, Russia and Brazil and the highest number of deaths in India, USA, Argentina, Iran and Brazil.
- In the last week, India, USA, France Brazil, and the UK had the most new cases and India, USA, Brazil, Argentina, and Mexico had the most new deaths.
- The European Region is experiencing a rapid increase in cases and deaths, the highest increase compared to all other regions in the most recent reporting week. France, the UK, Russia, Czechia and Italy continue to report a high incidence of new cases. Slovenia reported a 150% increase in cases this week (n=4890) and 1924 deaths, compared to only one death last week.

• In the Region of the Americas, USA, Brazil, Argentina, Colombia and Mexico continue to register the highest number of weekly new cases, while the highest incidence of new cases per million population is being reported in Argentina, Bahamas, Costa Rica and Saint Martin (more than 1600 cases per million from Oct. 11-18).

International Updates (since Oct. 14, 2020 Partner Update)

The World Health Organization (WHO):

- Released interim results from the <u>Solidarity Therapeutics Trial</u> (coordinated by WHO), which indicate that remdesivir, hydroxychloroquine, lopinavir/ritonavir and interferon regimens appear to have little or no effect on 28-day mortality or the in-hospital course of COVID-19 among hospitalized patients.
- Is partnering with Kim Sledge and the World We Want to <u>re-record the unity anthem</u>, "We Are <u>Family</u>", in response to COVID-19 and to bring focus on global public health needs. A special edition cover of Sister Sledge's hit "We Are Family" will be released in a new and inspiring call for global solidarity to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic and to generate proceeds to address the most pressing global health challenges of our time. In support of the song's release, people worldwide are invited to submit videos of themselves singing We Are Family for inclusion in a compilation video for release on December 7, 2020.
- Director General expressed concern during the <u>weekly media briefing</u> around the concept of reaching so-called "herd immunity" by the letting the virus spread, stating: "Never in the history of public health has herd immunity been used as a strategy for responding to an outbreak, let alone a pandemic. It is scientifically and ethically problematic. "
- Released a joint statement on the <u>Impact of COVID-19 on people's livelihoods</u>, their health and <u>our food systems</u>. The pandemic has been affecting the entire food system and has laid bare its fragility. According to the <u>policy brief</u> published by the United Nations, in the long run, we face possible disruptions to the functioning of food systems, with severe consequences for health and nutrition.
- Published a <u>Handbook for public health capacity-building at ground crossings and cross-border</u> <u>collaboration</u>.
- Region of the Americas released guidance on <u>Resuming non-essential international travel in the</u> <u>context of the COVID-19 pandemic</u>.
