Key messages from Dr. Gardner, Medical Officer of Health

1. Simcoe Muskoka moves into 'Red-Control'

Our area moved into 'Red-Control', as Ontario saw cases surge to 2,275 in one day, another single day record. <u>I have issued a special statement</u> outlining the required changes as our area moves into "Red-Control' and our <u>COVID-19 webpages</u> have been updated with information and expectations for businesses and workplaces, municipalities and partners, and individuals and families under the Red-Control classification. I urge you to visit them to clarify any questions you have.

The biggest change is in the numbers of people who can gather. At this time, gatherings are limited to only 5 indoors (but it is recommended no one outside of your household visits indoors) and a maximum of 25 outdoors. There are public health and business restrictions that can be found in <u>Ontario Regulation 263/20</u> and through the <u>SMDHU</u> <u>Website</u> where guidance documents are being updated to reflect the Red Framework.

As the pandemic goes on we continue to be challenged emotionally, physically, socially and financially. I know how fatigued people are of this pandemic and I know further restrictions make things even more difficult, particularly during the holiday season. It is absolutely crucial that everyone limit their close social interactions. I encourage businesses to have employees work remotely, where possible and I implore everyone in Simcoe Muskoka to:

- Have close social contact with only people living your household;
- Limit activities outside your home to only those that are essential (e.g. work, school, groceries/pharmacy, health care, assisting vulnerable individuals, and exercise/physical activity);
- Gather with those outside of your immediate household virtually; and
- Wear a face covering in indoor public spaces, and outdoors if physical distancing cannot be maintained.

2. Local vaccine and immunizations

There is hope on the horizon with the arrival of COVID-19 vaccines. In collaboration with the province, the health unit and key healthcare partners are preparing for the largest undertaking of public immunization in recent history. Locally in partnership with RVH and

key stakeholders, SMDHU will be leading the efforts to immunize residents in Simcoe Muskoka. I expect SMDHU will be vaccinating people against COVID-19 into fall of next year.

The Ministry of Health created a three-phase plan for vaccine roll out. The following groups will be the first to receive the vaccine in Ontario over the next few months:

- Residents, staff, essential caregivers, and other employees of congregate living settings (e.g. long-term care homes and retirement homes) that provide care for seniors as they are at higher risk of infection and serious illness from COVID-19;
- Health care workers, including hospital employees, other staff who work or study in hospitals, and other health care personnel;
- Adults in Indigenous communities, including remote communities where risk of transmission is high; and
- Adult recipients of chronic home health care.

3. MOH issues letter to parents and guardians of school children

On Monday, I issued a letter to the parents and guardians of school children asking that they talk with their kids about taking precautions outside of school hours. In the school setting there are protocols in place to reduce the risk of transmission between students. Once they leave school they need to continue to follow precautions including masking, physical distancing, and hand washing. It is important for children to understand that outside of the school setting physical distancing, masking, and frequent handwashing/ sanitizing are still necessary even with students/friends both inside and outside of classroom cohorts.

During the holiday break we are asking parents to reinforce some important actions:

- Avoid indoor gatherings with others outside of your household and if outdoors, keep the number small;
- Wear a mask and stay 2 metres away from those not from your household;
- Be aware of the symptoms of COVID-19 and stay home when feeling sick; and
- Download the COVID-19 alert app onto compatible mobile devices.

Our youth are important contributors to helping us reduce transmission and we need the adults in their lives, particularly parents and guardians, to reinforce that message. The letter is posted on our <u>COVID webpages under Schools</u>.

4. Case and Contact Management (CCM) changes

With the primary goal to reach cases and contacts as quickly as possible to ensure they have the necessary information to prevent further transmission, SMDHU has implemented changes to our CCM, including:

- Reducing the amount of information we are gathering to shorten interview times and increase the number of new cases we can reach per day;
- No longer providing further follow-up with cases, however, investigators will be available by phone for further questions or guidance when needed; and
- We are asking people with positive tests to reach out to their close contacts to inform them they need to quarantine (self-isolate) for 14 days from the last exposure and to get tested.

People with positive tests are educated about who is considered a close contact (anyone in your household or anyone outside of your household that you have had close contact [within 2 metres] with when you and the other person were not wearing masks) and a fact sheet has been developed for close contacts to understand what they need to do next.

Highlights:

- In the last day there has been an increase of:
 - o 52 new cases
 - o 41 recovered cases
 - o 3 new hospitalizations
 - o 1 new death
- There are currently 17 people hospitalized in Simcoe Muskoka.
- So far this week (starting Dec. 13), there have been 213 new cases reported to the health unit. Last week (Dec. 6th 12th), there were 333 new COVID-19 cases reported by the health unit which was the highest number of weekly cases reported since the pandemic began.
- Approximately half of all new infections in December with a known cause were acquired from close contact with a confirmed positive case and about 20% were acquired in the community with no known source of infection.
- Nearly one-third of all active cases are among young adults 18-34 years. This age group has had the highest rate of infection since June and the rate in November and December for this age group is double the rate in September and October.
- There are currently 26 ongoing outbreaks in Simcoe Muskoka including seven in educational settings, six in congregate settings, four each in long-term care and retirement homes, three in workplaces, two in correctional facilities and one in a hospital.
- There are currently 16 ongoing outbreaks in Simcoe Muskoka,
- Highlights from last reporting week (Dec. 6-12):
 - The weekly incidence rate in Simcoe Muskoka increased to 312 new cases, with the average daily growth of cases being 1.8%;
 - 23% of new cases had no epidemiological link and 23% were related to outbreaks; and
 - The average daily growth in confirmed cases was 1.8% (based on the same growth, projections show there will be 425 cases reported during the week of January 3 – January 9, 2021 or about 60 cases per day).

- National highlights from the last published reporting week of Nov. 29 to Dec. 5:
 - All provinces and territories except the Northwest Territories reported new cases.
 - Age specific incidence rates increased in all age groups, with the largest increase observed among those 20 to 29 years of age followed by those 40 to 49 years of age. The highest age specific incidence rates were observed in those 80 years of age and older and in those 20 to 29 years of age.
 - 560,763 people were tested, representing a 7% increase compared to the previous week.
 - Manitoba continues to report the highest age-standardized incidence rate (158.8 new cases per 100,000 population), while the largest increase in age-standardized incidence rate compared to the previous week was observed in BC (from 60.8 to 148 cases per 100,000 population).
 - On Dec 5 there were 2,832 cases hospitalized and 552 cases in ICU, representing a 17% and 18% increase, respectively, in the daily hospitalized and ICU cases compared to Nov. 28.
 - 40% of hospitalized cases were 60 to 79 years of age (This age group continues to account for the highest proportion of cases hospitalized and admitted to ICU, followed closely by the 80 years and older age group).
 - 560,763 people were tested for COVID-19, representing a 7% increase in testing compared to the previous week.
 - According to forecasting, between 531,300 to 577,000 cumulative reported cases and 14,410 to 14,920 cumulative deaths are expected by December 25, 2020.
