Key messages from Dr. Gardner, Medical Officer of Health

Pregnant individuals are now eligible for vaccination

- As of April 23, pregnant individuals are now eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine under the highest-risk health conditions in Ontario's Phase 2 prioritization guidance.
- Those who are pregnant can book an appointment through the Provincial Vaccine Booking Line at 1-833-943-3900. A letter from a health care provider is not required.
- It is recommended, but not required, that pregnant individuals discuss the risks versus benefits of vaccination with a health care provider who is familiar with their pregnancy before getting vaccinated.
- Partners of those who are pregnant <u>are generally not eligible</u>; they are only eligible as essential caregivers if they are required to provide regular and sustained assistance to their pregnant partner with personal care and/or daily living activities.

Bradford West Gwillimbury (BWG) hot spot update

- As of April 23, residents 40 years and older living *anywhere* within BWG are now eligible for vaccination. Residents 40 years of age and older can book through the Town of BWG website and, as of April 27, residents ages 45+ can now book online via the provincial system.
- We are seeing an improvement in vaccination coverage in BWG. The proportion of BWG residents who had received their first vaccine dose prior to April 15 was 12% and, as of April 25, 23% of BWG residents had received their first dose.
- Special clinics were hosted for agricultural workers in the Holland Marsh area of BWG last week which saw more 90% of those workers vaccinated. These clinics were collaboratively organized by the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit (SMDHU), the Holland Marsh Growers' Association, York Region Health Unit and local municipalities.

Ontario expands vaccine eligibility to licensed childcare workers

- Starting Thursday, April 29, childcare workers in licensed childcare settings will be able to book an appointment via the Provincial Vaccine Booking Line at 1-833-943-3900.
- Eligible workers will receive a letter from their employer. This letter must be available at the time of booking and taken to their vaccination appointment.
- In the coming weeks, it is expected that eligibility will be expanded to childcare workers in unlicensed childcare settings across the province.

Process for those needing support at immunization clinics

- We want to do all that we can to ensure that everyone who attends our immunization clinics has a positive experience. We are able to provide accommodation in a number of ways to support our clients' needs, such as providing a low stimulation environment, drive-thru option, or an appointment before or after the clinic starts.

Vaccination coverage by municipality

- We now have data on vaccination coverage by municipality which is available on our <u>HealthSTATS</u> webpage.
- We have seen lower rates of vaccination than expected in some regions. In particular, 7 lower-tier municipalities have a vaccination rate of less than 70% among adults 80 years and older. We have reached out to these municipalities and are working together to develop and implement tailored strategies to increase vaccination coverage in these communities. Some strategies we are exploring include hosting pop-up clinics, advocating for additional pharmacies to be included, and expanding available transportation supports to clinics.
- As a reminder, the best vaccine to get is the first one that is available to you. If you are eligible, please make sure to get vaccinated.

Next week is Mental Health Week

- Mental Health Week is a Canadian tradition, with communities, schools, and workplaces rallying to celebrate, protect, and promote mental health.
- We know that the pandemic has taken a significant toll on people's mental health, both nationally and locally. On our Local Impact Survey, 45% of Simcoe Muskoka residents reported increased stress levels and 49% reported worsening anxiety since the start of the pandemic.
- We encourage you to attend Our Health North Simcoe's live event on 'Mental Health and Addictions in the Time of COVID-19' which is taking place next Thursday, May 6th at 7:30 pm. A panel of local experts will unpack the impact of the pandemic on mental health and explore options for local support. This event will be broadcasted on all Rogers TV Simcoe County channels.

Simcoe Muskoka education and enforcement initiative

- On April 30 and May 1, the Ministry of Labour, Training and Skills Development will be
 working with local police officers, public health, and municipal bylaw enforcement to
 conduct education and enforcement visits across Simcoe Muskoka. These inspections
 will assist with confirming that retail businesses and workplaces are complying with the
 provincial Reopening Ontario (A Flexible Response to COVID-19) Act, 2020 and
 associated regulations. Some of the measures in these regulations include:
 - Safety plans must be written and posted where easily seen;
 - Screening staff and customers for symptoms of COVID-19;
 - o Proper use of masks and face coverings; and,
 - Crowd control measures and capacity limits to ensure proper physical distancing.
- Businesses are encouraged to visit the SMDHU <u>website</u> often for information and resources to support them in operating in compliance with COVID-19 emergency measures. SMDHU's <u>Health Connection</u> line is also available.

In the last day:

- 99 people tested positive, 80 people recovered, and there was 1 new death.
- There were 90 new variant cases* identified.

Currently:

- There have been 210 new cases reported to the health unit for the current week.
- 50 Simcoe Muskoka residents are hospitalized for COVID-19.
- There are 959 active variant cases*.
- There are 21 ongoing outbreaks (workplaces: 12, congregate settings: 3, institutions: 3, community settings: 2, educational settings: 1), including 13 active outbreaks with known variant cases.

Since the last Partner Update:

- We have reported 587 new cases, 314 recoveries, and 5 new deaths.
- There are 230 more active cases compared to the same day last week.
- There are 2 fewer active outbreaks compared to the same day last week.
- During the week of April 18, there were 635 new cases reported to SMDHU, which was 11% lower than the 714 cases reported the week prior.

Highlights:

- 32,296 immunizations have been provided since the last Partner Update.
- Nearly 180,000 people have received their first dose, representing 28.8% of the population in Simcoe Muskoka. This includes:
 - o 25,619 adults 80 years of age and older (86%);
 - o 18,680 adults 75-79 years of age (83%);
 - o 25,161 adults 70-74 years of age (77%); and,
- Over 30,000 doses of the AstraZeneca vaccine have been administered by primary care settings and pharmacies in Simcoe Muskoka.
- Over 22,200 people have received both required doses of the vaccine, representing 3.2% of the population in Simcoe Muskoka.

As of today:

- There were 3,480 new cases, 4,517 resolved cases, and 24 deaths in the last day.
- There is a total of 60,355 confirmed cases of the U.K. variant, 220 cases of the South African variant, and 405 cases of the Brazilian variant.
- A total of 2,281 people are hospitalized for COVID-19, 877 people are in intensive care units (ICU) and 605 people are on ventilators.
- There are 742 ongoing outbreaks (workplaces: 259, schools and childcares: 160, congregate living: 124, other settings: 104, health care settings: 95).

Since the last Partner Update:

- There have been 26,483 new cases, 30,348 recoveries, and 199 deaths.
- There are 4,064 fewer active cases compared to the same day last week.
- There are 54 fewer people hospitalized, 87 more people in the ICU, and 39 more people on ventilators compared to the same day last week.
- The 7-day average number of new daily cases is 3,783.

Vaccine status:

• A total of 4,907,203 vaccine doses have been administered to date, with 116,173 doses administered yesterday. 365,166 people in Ontario have been fully vaccinated.

Regional updates:

- Areas with the highest number of active cases per 100,000 population: Peel (617.77), Toronto (463.40), Niagara (340.04), York (324.62), and Brant (289.75).
- Areas with the highest number of active cases: Toronto (12,658), Peel (8,536), York (3,603), Ottawa (2,582), and Durham (1,856).

Weekly Epidemiological Summary highlights: April 11-17, 2021:

- A total of 30,490 cases were reported this week, compared to 25,694 cases the week prior. The number of cases reported this week represents the largest number of weekly cases reported in Ontario since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Approximately 39% of COVID-19 cases reported this week were those with confirmed or presumed B.1.1.7 (U.K. variant) lineage.

Yesterday:

- Canada reported 7,072 new cases and 55 deaths.
- New cases were reported in all provinces and territories except PEI, NL, NWT, and YT.
- Deaths were reported in AB, SK, ON, QC, and NB.

Since the last Partner Update:

- In the last week, 55,946 people tested positive for COVID-19, 352 people died, and 59,153 people recovered.
- There are 3,559 fewer active cases of COVID-19 than there was a week ago.

Between April 12 and April 19, 2021:

- The number of COVID-19 patients hospitalized increased from 2,749 to 3,205.
- The number of COVID-19 patients in ICU beds increased from 1,028 to 1,215.
- The number of COVID-19 patients mechanically vented increased from 599 to 747.

Weekly epidemiology update: April 11-17, 2021:

- New cases increased by 17% compared to the previous week, with an average of 8,730 new cases reported every day.
- New deaths decreased by 20% compared to the previous week, with an average of 42 deaths reported every day.
- The number of weekly hospitalizations and ICU admissions continued to increase, with a 30% increase in hospitalized cases and a 22% increase in ICU admissions compared to the week prior.
- Daily case rates remain highest among those 20-39 years of age and lowest among those 80 years and older.
- According to forecasting, between 1,209,780 to 1,281,040 cumulative reported cases and 24,000 to 24,570 deaths are expected by May 2, 2021.

Key vaccine updates as of April 17, 2021:

- 24.21% of the population has received at least one COVID-19 vaccine dose, including: 86.63% of adults aged 80 or older and 79.45% of adults 70-79 years of age.
- 2.37% of population have received both required doses of the vaccine.

In the last day:

- There were 702,752 new cases and 12,172 deaths.
- India, the U.S., Turkey, Brazil, and Iran reported the most new cases and India, Brazil, the U.S., Iran, and Poland reported the most deaths.

In the past week:

- Nearly 5.9 million new cases and 92,781 deaths were reported.
- India, Brazil, the U.S., Turkey, and France reported the most new cases and India, Brazil, India, the U.S., Poland, and Colombia reported the most new deaths.

Highlights from Weekly Epidemiological Summary as of April 25, 2021:

- The number of new global COVID-19 cases continued to increase for the ninth consecutive week, with nearly 5.7 million new weekly cases reported.
- The number of reported new deaths increased for the sixth consecutive week, with over 87,000 new deaths reported.
- The South-East Asia region reported the highest increase in both cases and deaths for the third consecutive week, with India accounting for the vast majority of this regional trend. India accounted for 38% of global cases reported in the past week.
