Key messages from Dr. Gardner, Medical Officer of Health

Expanded eligibility for COVID-19 vaccination

- The rollout of COVID-19 vaccination continues to accelerate in Simcoe Muskoka and across the province. As of May 18, anyone turning 18 years of age or older in 2021 is now eligible to book a COVID-19 vaccination appointment through the provincial system. All previously eligible groups can continue to book. Detailed information about how to book an appointment is available on our website.
- Youth between the ages of 12 and 17 will become eligible to book a vaccination appointment through the provincial system beginning the week of May 31, 2021. Locally, we are working with our school board partners to plan for special COVID-19 immunization clinics for youth and their adult family members to take place in mid-late June. We will provide more details on this in the coming weeks.
- Those turning 18 years of age or older in 2021 who live or work anywhere in the hot spot of Bradford West Gwillimbury (BWG) can book an appointment at a BWG-specific clinic through the Town of BWG website.
- While it comes as great news that all adults are now eligible for vaccination, it is important to remember that this does not mean we will be able to vaccinate everyone right away. It will take time to provide vaccination to all Simcoe Muskoka residents who wish to receive it. Please be patient and, if appointments do book up, check back regularly for updated availability as we will continue to provide opportunities for vaccination based on our capacity and vaccine supply.

COVID-19 vaccine rollout in local pharmacies and primary care settings

- 30 pharmacies in our region now have Pfizer or Moderna vaccine to administer to anyone
 who meets current provincial eligibility criteria for a first dose appointment. Additional
 pharmacies will be coming onboard in the coming weeks. Appointments can be booked
 directly at participating pharmacies.
- Our Moderna vaccination pilot in primary care is now underway and participating
 providers administered their first allocation of vaccine last week. Participating providers
 will continue to reach out to eligible patients directly to book appointments based on
 vaccine supply. Please do not reach out to your primary care provider to inquire
 about this.

Second dose appointments for those who received their first dose before March 17

- The provincial booking system is still not able to accommodate only dose 2 bookings. As such, the health unit is implementing our own dose 2 booking system for those who were immunized prior to the provincial booking system was launched on March 17, 2021. Those who provided an e-mail address to us when receiving their first dose are receiving an e-mail in the coming days with information about how to book, and this information will also be posted on our website by the end of this week.
- For those who received a COVID-19 vaccine through a pharmacy or health care provider, they will contact you for your second dose appointment. This program rollout is separate from the community clinics and cannot be booked on the provincial site.

Messaging for the upcoming long weekend

- The Victoria Day long weekend marks the unofficial start to summer and, with this, can come the desire to gather with others. However, now is not the time to let down our guards. While it is encouraging to see that local and provincial COVID-19 case numbers have started to go down, overall cases, transmission, and hospitalizations remain high.
- The virus can only move if we do. We are asking that everyone, regardless of vaccination status, please continue to abide by the stay-at-home order over the long weekend to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. This means avoiding all non-essential travel, staying home, not gathering with those outside your household, and finding virtual ways to connect with loved ones.
- For those with primary and secondary residences, we are asking that you choose one location as your home and stay there. Please do not travel between residences.
- There is no question that we all want to have a good summer and put the COVID-19 pandemic behind us. But in order to do so, we need to continue to be vigilant in following public health measures as we work toward vaccinating most of our population. Thank you to the many people who continue to abide by the stay-at-home order and public health measures we know that doing so is not easy and comes at a cost, but your actions have and continue to help prevent cases and save lives. Ultimately, our ability to bring the third wave and the pandemic under control depends on each and every one of us and our individual and collective actions.

In the last day:

- 51 people tested positive, 63 people recovered, and there were no new deaths.
- There were 40 new variant cases* identified.

Currently:

- There have been 115 new cases reported to the health unit for the current week.
- 27 Simcoe Muskoka residents are hospitalized with COVID-19.
- There are 562 active variant cases*.
- There are 13 ongoing outbreaks (workplaces: 10, institutions: 2, educational settings: 1), including 11 active outbreaks with known variant cases.

Since the last Partner Update:

- We have reported 322 new cases, 382 recoveries, and 6 new deaths.
- There are 71 fewer active cases compared to the same day last week.
- There are 2 fewer active outbreaks compared to the same day last week.

 During the week of May 9, there were 340 new cases reported to the health unit which was 23% lower than the 444 cases reported the week prior.

 - 26,422 adults 80 years of age and older (93%);
 - o 47,300 adults 70-79 years of age (87%);
 - o 66,308 adults 60-69 years of age (82%); and,
 - o 50,727 adults 50-59 years of age (56%).
- Over 23,900 people have received both required doses of the vaccine, representing 4.0% of the population in Simcoe Muskoka.

As of today:

- There were 1,588 new cases, 3,119 resolved cases, and 19 deaths in the last day.
- There has been a total of 112,759 confirmed cases of the U.K. variant, 683 cases of the South African variant, and 2,059 cases of the Brazilian variant.
- A total of 1,401 people are hospitalized for COVID-19, 735 people are in intensive care units (ICU) and 539 people are on ventilators.
- There are 598 ongoing outbreaks (workplaces: 250, schools and childcares: 114, other settings: 89, health care settings: 79, congregate living: 66).

Since the last Partner Update:

- There have been 15,278 new cases, 21,673 recoveries, and 151 deaths.
- There are 6,546 fewer active cases compared to the same day last week.
- There are 272 fewer people hospitalized, 41 fewer people in the ICU, and 20 fewer people on ventilators compared to the same day last week.
- The 7-day average number of new daily cases is 2,183.

Vaccine status:

• A total of 7,431,638 vaccine doses have been administered to date, with 145,461 doses administered yesterday. 456,784 people in Ontario have been fully vaccinated.

Regional updates:

- Areas with the highest number of active cases per 100,000 population: Peel (422.29), Toronto (273.47), Porcupine (194.77), Durham (180.53), and Brant (171.18).
- Areas with the highest number of active cases: Toronto (7,470), Peel (5,835), York (1,490), Durham (1,166), and Ottawa (1,081).

Weekly Epidemiological Summary highlights: May 2-8, 2021:

- During the week of May 2, there were 20,717 cases reported, representing a 17.1% decrease compared to the 25,001 cases reported the week prior.
- While the rate of cases continues to decrease across all age groups, there was a sharp decrease in cases reported among those aged 40-59 years old this week.
- 75.6% of reported cases this week tested positive for a mutation or variant of concern.

Yesterday:

- Canada reported 4,035 new cases and 37 deaths.
- New cases were reported in all provinces and territories except YT.
- New deaths were reported in BC, AB, SK, MB ON, QC, and NB.

Since the last Partner Update:

- In the last week, 38,569 people tested positive for COVID-19, 304 people died, and 51,556 people recovered.
- There are 13,291 fewer active cases of COVID-19 than there was a week ago.

Between May 3 and May 10, 2021:

- The number of COVID-19 patients hospitalized decreased from 2,946 to 2,594.
- The number of COVID-19 patients in ICU beds decreased from 1,384 to 1,281.
- The number of COVID-19 patients mechanically vented decreased from 799 to 753.

Weekly epidemiology update: May 2-8, 2021:

- New cases decreased by 4% compared to the previous week, with an average of 7,528 new cases reported every day.
- New deaths decreased by 2% compared to the previous week, with an average of 46 deaths reported every day.
- The number of weekly hospitalizations decreased by 4% and the number of weekly cases in the ICU decreased by 5% compared to the week prior.

- Daily case rates remain highest among those 20-39 years of age and lowest among those 80 years and older.
- According to forecasting, between 1,361,725 to 1,397,570 cumulative reported cases and 24,970 to 25,530 deaths are expected by May 23, 2021.

Key vaccine updates as of May 8, 2021:

- 38.87% of the population has received at least one COVID-19 vaccine dose, including:
 90.12% of adults aged 80 or older and 88.58% of adults 70-79 years of age.
- 3.30% of population have received both required doses of the vaccine.

In the last day:

Highlights from Weekly Epidemiological Summary as of May 16, 2021:

- There were just over 4.8 million new global cases reported this week, representing a 12% decrease from the week prior. There were just under 86,000 new deaths reported, which was a 5% decrease from the week prior.
- Despite the continued downward trend over the past three weeks, the incidence of cases remains at some of the highest levels since the beginning of the pandemic.
