Key messages from Dr. Gardner, Medical Officer of Health

Interchangeability of COVID-19 vaccines

- Full vaccination provides the strongest protection against COVID-19 and its variants, including the Delta variant. As such, it is crucial for all individuals to complete their vaccine series as soon as they are eligible and within the recommended dose interval.

 The best vaccine for your second dose is the first vaccine that is available to you.
- In alignment with recommendations from the National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI), individuals who received an mRNA vaccine (Moderna or Pfizer) for their first dose can safely receive either Moderna or Pfizer for their second dose. Mixing these COVID-19 vaccines is safe, provides strong protection, and enables more people to receive their second dose sooner.
- Individuals who received AstraZeneca for their first dose can safely receive Moderna, Pfizer, or AstraZeneca for their second dose. In fact, NACI is now recommending that an mRNA vaccine is preferred as the second dose for those who received a first dose of AstraZeneca. This recommendation was made based on emerging evidence of a better immune response from this mixed vaccine series and to mitigate the potential risk of rare blood clotting events associated with the AstraZeneca vaccine. Those who received a first dose of the AstraZeneca vaccine can continue to choose to receive either an mRNA vaccine or AstraZeneca for their second dose at an interval of 8 to 12 weeks, with informed consent.
- Based on these recommendations and in response to an unexpected shipment delay of the Pfizer vaccine, the health unit will be providing Moderna as the primary vaccine to those aged 18 and older at our clinics. This will help ensure that people are not delayed in receiving their second dose when they are eligible. Individuals have the right to know which vaccine they are receiving, and we will ensure that people attending our clinics have the opportunity to ask questions and understand the risk of delaying their second dose.

Further acceleration of early second dose eligibility

Simcoe Muskoka has been identified as a provincial hot spot for the Delta variant and, accordingly, we will be further expanding eligibility for early second doses this week.
 Beginning Wednesday, June 23 at 8AM, all Simcoe Muskoka residents ages 18 and older who received a first dose of an mRNA vaccine on or before May 30 will be eligible to book or rebook their second dose appointment at an interval of at least 28 days.

- Beginning the week of June 28, all Ontarians, ages 18 and older who received a first dose of an mRNA vaccine, regardless of the date, will be eligible to book or rebook their second dose appointment at an interval of at least 28 days.
- According to the current provincial schedule, the majority of youth 12-17 years of age are
 to receive their second vaccine dose between August 9-22. Youth who are First Nations,
 Inuit, or Metis, a high-risk health care worker, an agricultural worker, or who have a high-risk health condition can continue to receive their second dose at an interval of 28 days.

Health unit seeking volunteers for COVID-19 vaccination clinics

- Our local COVID-19 vaccination program is one of the largest, most complex and most rapid mass vaccination programs in history. The success of our vaccination program to date is a result of the collective efforts of many individuals and organizations, including health unit staff and volunteers as well as our municipal, health care and community partners. SMDHU is grateful for the support of each staff member, volunteer and our many partners as we work together to protect the health of Simcoe Muskoka residents.
- There are currently 429 volunteers supporting our COVID-19 vaccine clinic operations across Simcoe Muskoka. Clinic volunteers contribute to an excellent client experience and provide essential support in non-clinical roles such as monitoring waiting areas, assisting and directing clients, and disinfecting and cleaning surfaces at the community clinics across our district.
- As our COVID-19 vaccine program continues to evolve and expand, the health unit is currently accepting applications for volunteer support in the COVID-19 vaccination clinics located in Barrie, Innisfil, Orillia, Bracebridge and Huntsville. Volunteers must be 18 years or older, be able to stand for long periods of time, work both indoors and outdoors, wear personal protective equipment (PPE), and obtain a satisfactory criminal record check upon hiring.

Messaging for the upcoming Canada Day holiday

- As people make plans for Canada Day, it is important that everyone, regardless of their vaccination status, abides by the restrictions in place under the <u>Reopening Ontario</u> <u>Roadmap</u>.
- Of note, the province is expected to remain in Step 1 until at least July 2, 2021. I would advocate for the province to abide by its timeline for reopening with at least 21 days between each step. Remaining in each step for at least 21 days provides the time needed to evaluate any impacts of relaxed restrictions on key public health and health system indicators. We have made great progress in bringing the third wave under control and following a cautious and gradual approach to reopening will help ensure that this progress continues.
- We encourage residents to safely celebrate Canada Day and abide by the following restrictions in place under Step 1 of the Reopening Ontario Roadmap:
 - Outdoor gatherings are limited to 10 people and indoor gatherings with non-household members are not permitted.
 - 2-metres physical distancing must be maintained from everyone outside your household, indoors and outdoors, and a face covering should be worn when this distance cannot be maintained.
 - Drive-by events are restricted to concert venues, theatres, and cinemas in association with a drive-in cinema, drive-in or drive-thru concert and/or performance.
 - A face covering must be worn in all indoor public spaces and workplaces.
 - Stay home and get tested if you have symptoms of COVID-19.

In the last day:

• 9 people tested positive, 5 people recovered, there were no new hospitalizations, and there were no new deaths.

Currently:

- There have been 9 new cases reported to the health unit for the current week.
- 14 Simcoe Muskoka residents are hospitalized with COVID-19.
- There are 72 active variant cases*.
- There are 2 ongoing outbreaks, both of which are in congregate settings and have known variant cases.
- There has been a total of 33 confirmed cases of the Delta variant in Simcoe Muskoka.

Since the last Partner Update:

- We have reported 61 new cases, 83 recoveries, and 3 new deaths.
- There are 25 fewer active cases compared to the same day last week.
- There are 4 fewer active outbreaks compared to the same day last week.
- During the week of June 13, there were 67 cases reported to the health unit, which was 31% lower than the 97 cases reported the week prior. This was the lowest weekly case total since September 2020.

Highlights:

- 47,880 immunizations have been provided since the last Partner Update.
- Nearly 385,500 people have received their first dose, representing 64% of the total population and 74% of adults ages 18 and older in Simcoe Muskoka. This includes:
 - o 215,709 adults 50 years of age and older (85%);
 - o 148,594 adults 18-49 years of age (62%); and,
 - o 21,167 youth 12-17 years of age (54%).
- Over 113,100 people have received both required doses of the vaccine, representing 18.7% of the total population and 22.9% of adults 18 and older in Simcoe Muskoka.

As of today:

- There were 255 new cases, 460 resolved cases, and 11 deaths in the last day.
- The total confirmed variant of concern cases in Ontario are as follows:
 - o Lineage B.1.1.7 (Alpha variant): 142,647
 - o Lineage B.1.351 (Beta variant): 1,154
 - o Lineage P.1 (Gamma variant): 4,263
 - o Lineage B.1.617.2 (Delta variant): 975
- A total of 295 people are hospitalized with COVID-19, 305 people are in intensive care units (ICU) due to COVID-related critical illness, and 190 people are on ventilators.
- A total of 13,096,628 vaccine doses have been administered. 65.9% of all Ontarians and 75.4% of those ages 12 and older have received their first vaccine dose. 22.6% of all Ontarians and 25.9% of those ages 12 and older have been fully vaccinated.
- There are 130 ongoing COVID-19 outbreaks (workplaces: 46, congregate living: 26, other settings: 25, health care settings: 17, schools and childcares: 16).

Since the last Partner Update:

- There have been 2,209 new cases, 3,732 recoveries, and 107 deaths.
- There are 1,630 fewer active cases compared to the same day last week.
- There has been a 49% increase in the number of confirmed cases of the Delta variant.
- There are 143 fewer people hospitalized, 72 fewer people in the ICU, and 52 fewer people on ventilators compared to the same day last week.
- The 7-day average number of new daily cases is 316.

Regional updates:

- Areas with the highest number of active cases per 100,000 population: Porcupine (174.58), Waterloo (87.45), North Bay (55.73), Niagara (29.47), and Brant (25.94).
- Areas with the highest number of active cases: Toronto (692), Waterloo (468), Peel (353), Ottawa (172), and Porcupine (147).

Weekly Epidemiological Summary highlights: June 6-12, 2021:

- During the week of May 30, there were 3,497 new cases reported, which represented a 33% decrease compared to the 5,209 cases reported the week prior.
- Reinfections have accounted for a very small proportion (0.04%) of cases in Ontario. The majority of reinfections (42%) have occurred among cases 20-39 years of age.
- 75.1% of reported cases this week tested positive for a mutation or variant of concern.

Yesterday:

- Canada reported 627 new cases and 71 new deaths.
- New cases were reported in all provinces and territories except PEI, NWT, and NT.
- New deaths were reported in AB, MB, ON, QC, and NS.

Since the last Partner Update:

- In the last week, 6,113 people tested positive for COVID-19, 183 people died, and 10,691 people recovered.
- There are 4,761 fewer active cases of COVID-19 than there was a week ago.

Key vaccine updates as of June 23, 2021:

- 66.3% of the population has received at least one COVID-19 vaccine dose, including 76.2% of those ages 12 and older.
- 21.1% of the population has been fully vaccinated, including 24.2% of those ages 12 and older.

Between June 8 and June 15, 2021:

- The number of COVID-19 patients hospitalized decreased from 1,177 to 914.
- The number of COVID-19 patients in ICU beds decreased from 674 to 534.
- The number of COVID-19 patients mechanically vented decreased from 413 to 323.

Weekly epidemiology update: June 6-12, 2021:

- New cases decreased by 33% compared to the previous week, with an average of 1,387 new cases reported every day.
- New deaths decreased by 18% compared to the previous week, with an average of 28 deaths reported every day.
- The number of weekly hospitalizations decreased by 21% and the number of weekly cases in the ICU decreased by 17% compared to the week prior.
- Variants of concern represent an increasing proportion (approximately 65%) of reported cases from mid-April to mid-May 2021.
- According to forecasting, between 1,407,545 to 1,420,335 cumulative reported cases and 26,060 to 26,450 cumulated reported deaths are expected by June 27, 2021.

Weekly Epidemiological Summary highlights: June 14-20, 2021:

- During the week of June 14, there were over 2.5 million new cases reported, which
 represented a 6% decrease compared to the week prior and the lowest weekly case
 count since February 2021.
- There were over 64,000 deaths reported, which represented a 12% decrease compared to the week prior. While the number of new deaths continues to decline, global mortality remains high with over 9,000 new deaths reported each day.
