Local Issues

Ontario moves to modified Step 2 of Roadmap to Reopen

- As of January 5, 2022, Ontario is in Step Two of the Roadmap to Reopen with modifications that consider the province's ongoing vaccination efforts.
- The move is in response to the alarming increase in COVID-19 hospitalizations and is meant to blunt the transmission of COVID-19 to prevent hospitals from becoming overwhelmed, and to protect the capacity of the healthcare and public health systems due to staff shortages from COVID-19 infections and isolation requirements.
- Public health measures will be in place for at least 21 days (until January 26) and are subject to trends in public health and the impacts on the health system. A full list of measures is available on the province's website.
- Hospitals are also pausing all non-emergent and non-urgent surgeries and procedures to preserve critical care and human resources capacity, and students will not be returning to in-person learning until at least January 17.

Changes to HealthSTATS

- Like other health units across the province, capacity issues are requiring that the health unit adjusts its case management procedures. This impacts some important COVID-19 case and contact data as the collection of this information has been suspended. The result will be the following changes to our HealthSTATS pages:
 - As of Wednesday, January 12, 2022, the <u>COVID-19 Case Explorer</u> will be deactivated. The case explorer was originally created to provide case-based information by municipality. Without accurate geographic assignments (based on case address), municipality-level data is no longer possible.
 - Most of the geographic distribution expander bar section will be revised on the <u>COVID-19 Case Characteristics and Geographic Distribution page</u>. All municipality-level data will be removed and where possible, replaced with data for Simcoe County and the District of Muskoka.
- The rising case numbers not only impacts data collection, but also the health unit's
 capacity to follow up on positive cases. As previously communicated, the health unit is
 only doing follow up on positive cases that are from a high-risk priority group such as
 those in long-term care homes and other congregate settings.

Vaccination update

- Currently there are more than 50,600 booster appointments booked at all Simcoe
 Muskoka District Health Unit (SMDHU) led clinics until January 20, with appointments also
 booked through to the end of January at 29 Sperling.
- As of December 30, 167,841 Simcoe Muskoka residents had received a third dose/booster (34% of the population 18+; 51% of 50+; and 69% of 70+ population).
- Our staff and partners are doing their best to get as many people vaccinated as quickly as possible. Please be patient and respectful when trying to book an appointment and when attending walk-in vaccination clinics.
- In contrast, the vaccination coverage rate for first dose for children aged five to 11 years is at 41% and we would like to see this number increase quickly.
- Getting your child vaccinated is the best way to protect them from COVID-19 and to prevent them from passing the virus to grandparents or others who can get seriously ill.
- Children are most frequently exposed to COVID-19 by a close contact, so it is very
 important that all eligible household members get fully vaccinated as soon as possible.
 Even if someone in your household had COVID-19 before, it is still recommended that
 they get the COVID-19 vaccine.
- While most children who have gotten COVID-19 have milder symptoms or no symptoms, in rare instances, some children can become very ill with COVID-19 requiring hospitalization; some also experience a rare condition associated with COVID-19 infection called Multisystem Inflammatory Syndrome.

- Of the 32 people with COVID-19 who are currently hospitalized in Simcoe Muskoka, 8 are in the ICU.
- There have been 1,641 new cases reported to the health unit for the current week. There were 3,537 new cases reported to the health unit last week (week of December 26), more than double the 1,643 cases reported for the week of December 19.
- From November 7 to January 1, the rate of COVID-19 infection among the unvaccinated vaccine-eligible Simcoe Muskoka population is two times higher than it is for fully vaccinated population and the rate of COVID-19 hospitalizations is 17 times higher. Please note that due to the smaller number of unvaccinated hospitalized cases, one or two additional hospitalized cases will noticeably change the ratio listed above.
- Currently 85% of the population 5 years and older living in Simcoe Muskoka have had at least one dose of vaccine including 82% of youth 12 to 17 years of age. In addition, 41% of children 5 to 11 years of age have received at least one dose of vaccine.
- There are currently 48 active outbreaks, with no active outbreaks in local schools. (All remaining school outbreaks were declared over during the winter break).

Weekly highlights for December 27-January 2:

- Following a gradual increase since October, the global number of new cases increased sharply by 71% as compared to the previous week, while the number of new deaths decreased by 10%. This corresponds to just under 9.5 million new cases and over 41,000 new deaths reported during the last week. As of January 2, a total of nearly 289 million cases and just over 5.4 million deaths have been reported globally.
- All regions reported an increase in the incidence of weekly cases, with the Region of the Americas reporting the largest increase (100%), followed by the South-East Asia Region (78%) and the European Region (65%). The African Region reported a weekly increase in the number of new deaths (22%), while all the other regions reported a decrease as compared to the previous week.
- In the last week the highest number of cases were reported in: United States, India, Brazil, United Kingdom, and France.
