


Public Health Nurses and Inspectors are assigned to:

Infection Prevention and Control (IPAC) Complaints









Oral Health Program

Oral Health Protocol 2018

Registered dental hygienists and dental assistants conduct oral health screening and surveillance of children and youth

Screening and surveillance is done in schools, community and clinic locations

A quick, visual look in the mouth to assess if a child has urgent dental needs or would benefit from preventive services



23,729 children screened



1,809 identified and referred in need of urgent care




Preventive Service Provision

Our oral health team provides preventive services at clinics and school locations to children who qualify.

These services include:

- Pit and fissure sealants
- Topical fluoride application
- Scaling









Oral Health - Back to School

- Unable to screen in schools from March 2020 through September 2022 due to the COVID-19 pandemic
- Resumed school screening in October 2022 after a 2year break.

SMDHU Dental Clinics

Two fixed clinic locations:

- Barrie (80 Bradford)
- Gravenhurst
- Full dental services to children and adults on government funded dental benefits
- 4,272 appointments completed in 2019
- 3,931 appointments completed in 2022









Healthy Smiles Ontario (HSO)

- Free government-funded program designed for lower-income families
- Preventative, routine and emergency dental care for children 17 years old and under
- Eligibility based on household income and child's age
- Coverage period up to 1 benefit year or up to the child's 18th birthday
- Includes visits to a licensed dental provider



Seniors Dental Clinic Expansion 2019 - 2023






Health Promotion and Advocacy

- Proven to be a safe and effective way to reduce dental cavities for the population
- Health unit advocates for CWF and defends local challenges










Childhood Visual Impairments

Sexual Health Services

For low income, transient, high school students, post secondary students (including international students)



Free services are available and accessible in-person or by phone for clients with or without OHIP



A variety of services are available:

- Testing
- Treatment
- Community Referral
- Counselling



Outreach

Public Health Nurses provide on-site services including:

- Education on sexually transmitted infections and blood borne infection risks
- Naloxone distribution
- HIV point of care testing

- Comparing the number of cases before and after the introduction of each vaccine
- Decrease in disease following vaccination 2013 - 2017

Diphtheria	8,142	>99%	3
Measles	53,584	>99%	151
Mumps	36,101	98%	565
Pertussis	17,777	84%	2,769
Polio	2,545	100%	O
Rubella	14,974	>99%	1

- School immunization program for Grade 7
- Hepatitis B, Meningococcal, Human Papillomavirus Virus (HPV)
- Routine immunization clinics for publicly funded vaccines

Immunization Record Review



Under Immunization of School Pupils Act, the

following immunizations are required in Ontario:

- ✓ Diphtheria
- ✓ Tetanus
- Polio
- ✓ Pertussis
- ✓ Measles Mumps Rubella;
- ✓ Meningococcal (Men-C-ACY-W135)
- ✓ Chickenpox (born 2010 or later)

The health unit is required to maintain immunization records for:

- All children enrolled in licensed childcare
- All elementary and secondary students enrolled in school
- A valid medical exemption or affidavit must be submitted for those refusing vaccination

Vaccine Storage and Handling

- Monitor fridge and vaccine inventory for hospitals, pharmacies, health care provider practices and other institutions
- Vaccine inventory management for over \$15M of vaccine yearly – value does not include COVID-19 vaccine
- Annual fridge inspections approximately 500 locations per year



School Focused Nurses

- October 2020 SMDHU recruited 26 FTE Public Health Nurses
- School Focused Nurses contribute to infection prevention and control (IPAC) assessments and are integral in supporting the school- based immunization backlog from the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 school years
- SMDHU strives to continue to recruit School Focused Nurses • to support COVID-19 Infectious Diseases and Immunization programs
- SMDHU currently employs 14 School Focused Nurses until the end of June 2023

Simcoe Muskoka to hire 20 additional nurses for return to school

Since Dec 22, 2020 over 1.5 Million covid vaccine doses have been administered across Simcoe County & Muskoka

- COVID-19 Immunization Clinic (29 Sperling Drive, Barrie) operates 5 days per week
- All regional SMDHU offices operate 1 COVID-19 Immunization clinic per week

COVID-19 Immunization

- Pop-up COVID-19 Immunization clinics are offered weekly in each region
- Provision of vaccine and/or immunization support to:
 - 30 Long Term Care homes
 - 50 Retirement homes
 - 13 Seniors Congregate Living homes
- Vaccinations to homebound clients by SMDHU nurses



COVID-19 Immunization Partners

- The Provincial Go Vaxx Bus is a mobile vaccination clinic that provides public clinic locations and resources for targeted indoor clinics
- GoVaxx supported vaccination in Simcoe and Muskoka providing 32,152 doses
- Pharmacies
- Hospitals
- Primary Care Practitioners
- Urban Indigenous and First Nations communities
