3. Line lists Line lists n

Line lists maintained. Additional cases to be added as applicable (cases that did not attend the camp during their POC are still to be added to the line list).

- Separate lists for staff and campers.
- Maintain surveillance forms for remaining cohorts <u>not</u> affected (not required to be submitted to SMDHU)
- Daily update of new and resolved cases to be faxed to health unit on line listings –
 ID Team.

4. Hand Hygiene & Respiratory Precautions

- Frequent Hand hygiene (when campers/staff do not practice appropriate sneeze/cough etiquette, before/after eating or using restrooms, taking off masks or PPE, using shared equipment)
- Alcohol-based hand rubs (min 60%) readily available throughout camp
- Reminders/signs for cough and sneeze etiquette throughout camp

5. Physical Distancing & Masking

- Ensure physical distancing between cohorts
- Remove unnecessary furniture, equipment to allow for more space
- Visual cues to remind campers/staff of physical distancing
- Stagger washroom usage, aquatics and group activities

6. Staff Movement

- Staff are not to work at other recreational camps for the duration of the outbreak.
 Some administrative staff may work at multiple locations but will be on a case-by-case assessment.
- In an outbreak, staff assigned to an established cohort should remain with the camper cohort and not mix with other staff

7. Cohorting Specific to Outbreak

- Established cohorts must use public health measures (e.g. masking, physical distancing) when interacting with other cohorts for the duration of the outbreak
- Dedicated staff should be assigned to care for those in self-isolation
 - There should be separate staff for those self-isolating as cases vs those selfisolating as contacts
 - Staff caring for one group of cohorted individuals should be scheduled to always care to that group for the duration of the outbreak (e.g. staff assigned to care for high-risk contacts, only care for high-risk contacts)
 - Those dedicated staff should be sub-cohorted away from other staff for the duration of the outbreak

8. Isolation/Exclusion

- Immediate isolation of symptomatic campers/staff with COVID-19 symptoms
- If tolerated, the ill camper/staff should wear a medical mask
- Staff providing care for suspect/confirmed COVID-19 cases (even if individual has no symptoms) or high-risk contacts need to utilize droplet/contact precautions

- Those with suspect/confirmed COVID-19 should be isolated away from other campers/staff with non-COVID-19 symptoms who are in the medical centre
- When an individual develops symptoms, their cohort must immediately selfisolate until test results are known or alternate diagnosis given.
 - If the ill individual is positive, the cohort will be deemed high-risk contacts and recommended for testing
 - If testing of HRCs occurs offsite, HRCs cannot travel together to testing location and must be taken individually with staff wearing appropriate personal protective equipment
 - High-risk contacts should have their own individual accommodation (no room sharing with HRCs) until they can leave the camp
 - High-risk contacts cannot return to the camp until 14 days past their last exposure to the case. No excluded campers /staff will be allowed to attend if at 14 days they are symptomatic.
- Confirmed/Probable COVID-19 cases and high-risk contacts must not stay at the camp for their self-isolation period
- Ill individuals who test negative for COVID-19 should still be assessed for other
 infectious diseases but generally can return to camp programming if they do not
 have a fever and symptoms are improving.

9. Admissions/Activities

- New cohorts should be delayed until outbreak is over unless approved by the Medical Officer of Health
- Wilderness Expeditions, field trips, exchange trips must be delayed until outbreak is over unless departure already occurred prior to outbreak
- Any sensory/food activities should be cancelled unless reviewed with SMDHU
- All activities should be outdoors (weather permitting) during an outbreak
- Singing, playing of wind/brass instruments and/or heavy exertion physical activities should be deferred until the outbreak is over
- Essential visitors should be rescheduled if possible.

10. Education

- Post signage indicating outbreak.
- Increase education to staff responsible for caring for campers/staff in droplet/contact precautions
- Increase education to entire camp community regarding outbreak control measures including self-monitoring for sign and symptoms and reporting any symptoms to staff

11. Environmental Cleaning & Laundry

- Health Canada approved disinfectant for COVID-19 being used
- Frequency of cleaning/disinfection of high-touch surfaces should be increased beyond twice daily in outbreak situation.
- Items that are challenging to clean (e.g. wood-based objects, craft supplies, aquatic foam materials) should not be used during the outbreak

	•	If an outbreak is declared, all campers and staff will be asked to be tested	
	•	HRCs will be asked to have 2 swabs: 1 on day 0-6 and 1 on/after day 10 of the 14-day isolation period	
	•	All symptomatic individuals and high-risk contacts will be asked to be tested for COVID-19 using a lab-based PCR test (note: ID Now is not supported)	
		ote: Point of care antigen tests cannot be used for symptomatic individuals or ettings in outbreak.	
12.		OVID-19 Testing During an Outbreak Investigation:	
	•	Personal protective equipment should be used by staff if laundering campers' personal belongings, face coverings etc.	
	•	Laundering of linens, towels, personal clothing/toys and non-medical face coverings should be increased during an outbreak. High-temp washing and drying is recommended.	
	•	Continue with recommended cleaning/disinfection practices in non-affected rooms/common areas.	
	•	The room should not be used for other programming until it has received intensive cleaning.	
	•	Room where any suspect/confirmed case was in attendance requires an intensive clean of all items and surfaces (including steam-cleaning of any cloth-based furniture/carpets if applicable).	
	•	All sports/activity equipment to be cleaned and disinfected at higher frequencies
