Testing Recommendations for Children:

With some child cares already reopened and as schools will open in September, it is important for children attending child care/day camps and school settings who display symptoms consistent with COVID-19 to be tested for the purposes of early detection, prevention, control of outbreaks and surveillance in those settings. Even with atypical symptom presentation and low prevalence in the community, or low clinical likelihood in some children, we encourage testing where possible. Moreover, without a test done the child may be asked to self-isolate for 14 days from the onset of symptoms.

A nasopharyngeal (NP) swab or nasal swab is preferred over a throat swab due to greater sensitivity. However, we have noticed that some parents will only accept throat swabs for their children because of the discomfort from NP swabs, or a history of nose bleeds. A throat swab is acceptable and encouraged if the NP swab is not an option or the patient refuses the NP swab.

Viral culture kits (#390081) that include six throat swabs and six vials of universal transport media can be ordered from Public Health Ontario (PHO) Laboratory using the <u>linked requisition</u>. These are the same swabs used for herpes/STI viral cultures. More information is available in PHO's <u>COVID-19 Laboratory Testing Q&As</u>.
