Households and individuals receiving social assistance are unable to afford the cost of food, housing, and other basic necessities like transportation, phone and internet service, clothing, prescription medications, child care and school supplies. They are unable to afford a basic standard of living. Food access programs such as food banks, meal programs and community gardens are not the solution; more income is.

## Household Food Insecurity is a Serious Public Health Issue

Household food insecurity is the inadequate or insecure access to food due to lack of income. The number of households affected in Canada is at a new record high.

The percentage of people affected in our area is worsening.

Household food insecurity is a **serious public health issue** that affects people's physical, social and mental health and overall well-being



Household food insecurity takes a toll on the health of our communities and the health care system



The cause of household food insecurity isn't the price of food





Individuals and families living on a low income are most affected. About half report having trouble affording food.

People living on a middle-income are also feeling the squeeze.

In 2024, twice as many middle income households reported food insecurity compared with 2022 and 2023.

**Place matters:** Household food insecurity varies across communities in Simcoe Muskoka but is higher in large and medium sized urban areas when compared with smaller urban and rural areas.<sup>3</sup>

# Having a job does not guarantee food security.

In Ontario, more than half of households that are food insecure rely on wages, salaries, or self-employment as their primary income source.<sup>4</sup>

### Learn, speak out and take action on income solutions so everyone can afford basic needs like food.

#### **Provincial / Federal Solutions**

- Improve existing social assistance programs
- Strengthen legislation that supports jobs with livable wages, regular hours and benefits
- Implement a national basic income
- Strengthen federal income support policies/programs (e.g., Canada Child Care Benefit and Canada Disability Benefit)

### **Municipal Solutions**

- Create municipal poverty reduction plans
- Support access to free income tax filing
- Become a certified living wage employer and encourage local businesses to do the same
- Implement policies and programs that make life more affordable (e.g., subsidized transit and recreation programs)
