VACCINE FACTS

Haemophilus Influenzae Type B (HIB) (Act-Hib®, Hiberix®)

The HIB vaccine protects against infections caused by the HIB bacteria.

Who should get this vaccine? 1,3

Hib vaccine is included in other combination vaccines given routinely to children aged 2 months to 5 years of age.

This vaccine is available for children ≥ 5 years of age and adults in the following high risk groups:

- Anyone with a weakened immune system.
- Anyone who does not have a spleen, or whose spleen is not working well.
- Anyone who has had a hematopoietic stem cell, bone marrow or solid organ transplant.
- Anyone who has had a cochlear implant (pre/post).
- Anyone with primary antibody deficiencies.

How well does this vaccine work? 1,3

- 95-100% of those fully vaccinated are protected from Hib.
- Those with weak immune systems may not develop full protection.

Is there an alternative to this vaccine? ^{1,3}

At this time there are no other ways to prevent this disease. Hand washing and covering the mouth and nose while coughing/sneezing can help reduce the spread of disease.

Is this vaccine safe?

The risk of a serious reaction or side effect from this vaccine is much less than the risk of Haemophilus Influenzae B. If you experience any side effect worse than what is listed below, please seek medical advice and notify the health unit.

Who should not receive this vaccine? 1,3

 Anyone with an allergy to any of the vaccine components or who has had an allergic or anaphylactic reaction to this vaccine.
