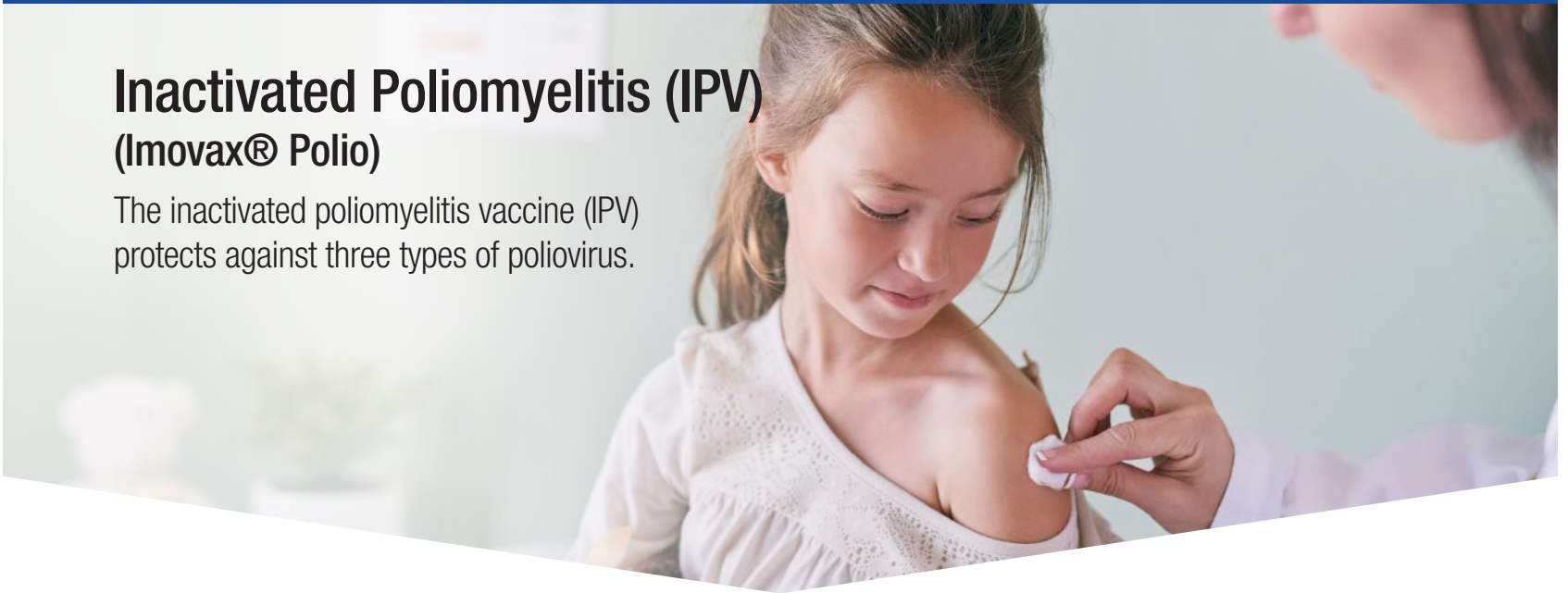


VACCINE FACTS

Inactivated Poliomyelitis (IPV) (Imovax® Polio)

The inactivated poliomyelitis vaccine (IPV) protects against three types of poliovirus.



Who should get this vaccine? ^{1,3}

Polio vaccine is included in other combination vaccines when given as a primary immunization series. A single booster dose of polio vaccine may be recommended for adults who are travelling to areas with a high risk of polio, or who are at high risk due to their occupation.

How well does this vaccine work? ^{1,3}

- 95-100% of those fully vaccinated are protected against polio.

Is there an alternative to this vaccine?

At this time there are no other ways to prevent this disease. Hand washing and covering the mouth and nose while coughing/sneezing can help reduce the spread of disease.

Is this vaccine safe?

The risk of a serious reaction or side effect from this vaccine is much less than the risk of polio. If you experience any side effect worse than what is listed below, please seek medical advice and notify the health unit.

Common side effects of this vaccine ^{1,3}

- Pain in the muscle
- Redness
- Swelling

Rare side effects ¹

- Anaphylaxis

Who should not receive this vaccine? ^{1,3}

Anyone with an allergy to any of the vaccine components or who has had an allergic or anaphylactic reaction to this vaccine.
