Medical Directives & Obtaining Informed Consent

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What are Medical Directives?

Physician orders that are not client specific

 They outline the procedures, treatments or interventions that may be implemented by designated staff members for certain groups of clients under specific conditions and circumstances



When do we need a Medical Directive?

- When a procedure falls within one of 13 Controlled Acts authorized to physicians (or dental surgeons) but not authorized to the staff expected to implement the procedure.
- With Immunization, we are performing:
 - Controlled Act # 5 Administering a substance by injection or inhalation. This is a controlled act, which is in the scope of nursing practice. A member of the College of Nurses may perform this procedure if a physician, dentist, chiropodist or midwife orders it.
 - Controlled Act # 8 Refers to the prescribing, dispensing, selling or compounding of a drug. Dispensing includes the selection, preparation and transfer of one or more doses to a client. When an RN or RPN administers a vaccine he/she is selecting, preparing and transferring the age appropriate dose of the vaccine to a person.



Delegation of a Controlled Act

RNs, RPNs and PHNs employed by the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit and authorized under a medical directive will have the required knowledge, skill and judgement to administer a vaccine safely, effectively, and ethically. The nurses have knowledge of the vaccine products, including the risks and benefits involved in administering.

Requirements:

- Certificate of Competence with College of Nurses
- Advanced medication course (if needed)
- Current CPR (annually)
- Comprehensive orientation (annually)
- Review of relevant resources



Obtaining Consent

According to the Health Care Consent Act (HCCA) and the College of Nurses of Ontario (CNO) standards, nurses are accountable for obtaining consent for interventions they provide.

A person is capable of giving consent if he or she:

- Understands the information
- Appreciates the consequences of a decision or lack of decision

There is no minimum age for consent



Elements Required for Consent to Treatment

- The consent must relate to the treatment
- The client must have the capacity to consent
- The consent must be given voluntarily
- The consent must not be obtained through misrepresentation or fraud
- The consent must be informed



What is Informed Consent?

An informed consent means the client must be provided with the information about the treatment that a reasonable person in the same situation would require to make a decision to consent or refuse the vaccine.

This information must include:

- The nature of the treatment
- Expected benefits
- Risks and side effects
- Alternative courses of action
- Likely consequences of not having the treatment
